The Air Force online personnel services website, known as myPers, is a total force source for personnel information and services. As a RegAF, Guard, Reserve or civilian employee, use myPers to get your questions answered and conduct personnel business online when it's convenient for you. The myPers website has informative articles on personnel pro- grams such as promotions, reenlistments, benefits, and transfers. Online services available include requesting your service verification letter, reviewing your current retirement points, accessing your official military personnel record, or nominating a member for a Federal award.

Upon entry there is a personalized home page just foryou. Sections like "I Would Like To", "Most Viewed Articles," "Announcements for Airmen," and a search function make it easy for you to stay up-to-date and allow you to access the virtual Personnel Center – Guard/Reserve, or vPC-GR, and other applications. If you are not already a

myPers user, visit the website from any computer, anytime, at mypers.af.mil. You

can log in using your common access card or a login name and password. If you need assistance, you can reach the myPers- Total Force Service Center by selecting the "Contact Us" link from the myPers webpage. You can select the "Email Us" link to correspond electronically, or choose the "Other Contact Information" link to find the toll free 800 number and other options available for reaching the myPers-Total Force Service Center. 

Absentee Voting

Deploying Wing Members,

Please exercise your right to vote by submitting your Absentee Voting application to your county election office.

Alabama voters please visit http://www.alabamavotes.gov/uocavavoterinstructions.aspx?m=voters

Members who live in another state please visit http://www.fvap.gov/

It's not too early to register for Absentee Voting, as a matter of fact the earlier the better.

Other useful information:

- -Currently all requests must be mailed to the county election official.
- -Under Federal Law, you can decide to have the federal portion of the ballot emailed to you. Must select that option on UOCAVA Absentee Request Form.
- -You must hand mail both parts of the Ballot via U.S. Mail or Commercial Carrier(UPS, Fed-Ex) to your county election official.
- -The best way to fill-out your Absentee ballot is utilizing the online assistant then print and mail it
- -Municipal elections are not covered under this process (You must apply through your City Clerk's office)
- -The preferred method to receive your ballot is via email. However, you must specify this on your request for Absentee ballot







Out of the graduating class of 20 Senior Airmen, four are members of the 187th Fighter Wing: Senior Airman Corey Andres from Civil Engineering Squadron, Senior Airmen Lashondra Lewis and Brady Mayfield from Security Forces Squadron and Senior Airman Damian Lomeli from Aircraft Maintenance Squadron.

Airman Leadership School (ALS) is part of the Air Force's Enlisted Professional Military Education course. The mission of ALS is to develop Senior Airmen to be combat-ready leaders, prepared to maintain and supervise Air Force work teams and support the Airmen and families for whom they are responsible.

Senior Airmen attend ALS classes in preparation for becoming a Noncommissioned Officer and future leader. The six week course teaches leadership styles, communication and interpersonal relations.

"The biggest aspect I got from it is different leadership styles," said Senior Airman Damian Lomeli. "I wasn't really aware of them before going and then learning what you need to do to be a more effective leader."

"It gives you perspective on what you actually need to do stepping into a supervisor role" said Lomeli.

After the graduation ceremony Senior Airmen Lashondra Lewis and Brady Mayfield, from Security Forces Squadron, were promoted to Staff Sgt.

REMINDERS & NOTICES



IMPORTANT NOTICE



In accordance with the ALNG TAG'S Policy Letter dated 21 November 2013, Privately Owned Weapons (POWs) are allowed on ALNG installations. Members must adhere to the following to comply with the policy:

-POWs are NOT allowed until member receives a commander's brief,
-POWs are NOT allowed until member signs a statement of understanding,
-POWs are NOT allowed inside any building,
-POWs must be stored in a locked privately owned vehicle,
-Members must be eligible to carry a POW, according to all statutes and ordinances,
-Park in a valid designated area; (DANG defines a valid designated parking area as any legal POV parking space).
-Personnel will not use POWs under any circumstances to aid Security Forces

-POWs are **NOT** allowed on federal installations, i.e. Maxwell and Gunter AFB.

This is the TAG's policy and it's not negotiable.
